








The Learning Journal Explained.

At Bushey Gan we follow the statutory framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS).

The EYFS is divided into 4 Themes & Principals and 16 Commitments:

The aim of the Learning Journal is to:

Celebrate children's achievements throughout their time within the Foundation Stage.	Serve as a reminder of the wonderful experiences children have.	Monitor and record the skills children are developing.	Enable staff to plan effectively in order to meet children's learning needs.
Show children's progression.	Record children's viewpoints.	Highlight the discoveries children make.	Support children when they are challenged.

Observations and information is gathered in the following ways:

- As the children play.
- Through daily conversation.
- Staff meetings
- Planning and assessment
- The children's work
- Talking with parents

KEY TEACHERS

All the children are allocated a **Key Teacher** who will build a bond with children and their parents/carer. This relationship will enable the key teacher to identify the child's individual needs and work closely with them to help them achieve and progress. It is important to share information with the key teacher to help with their overall development as well as the settling in process.

Each child has an **on-line Tapestry Learning Journal** which is our evidence of the child's development in the form of observations, photos, videos, and the Children's work, as well as assessment, and reports.

We will ask you to contribute to your child's Learning Journal as well as completing a base line assessment with you when you first join the Gan. You can learn more about Tapestry on the Tapestry tab.

Our children are individuals, learning at their own pace. We take on board what they know and build from there.

When your child leaves the Gan, you will be given the opportunity to download your child's on-line Learning Journal to enjoy. Your child's next school may want to see the end of year summary/report of your child's progress.
